Chris' Corner

Squeaky Floors

Bad news is, a lot of our homes in the neighborhood have squeaky floors. Wooden subfloors can be exposed to a great deal of ground moisture, and expand/contract through the changing seasons. However, with warmer weather approaching, many of the annoying floor squeaks you hear when it's cold, probably dissipate a great deal in the Spring & Summer. With this in mind, you may only have a short time left, until next Winter at least, of locating these squeaks and getting them resolved.

If you are in the process of, or intend to replace any flooring in the next couple of weeks, check to see if you have any squeaks or squeals coming from the area. This can quickly, and easily be rectified by re-securing your subfloors to the joists beneath them with screws or nails. It is important that you find a floor joist to screw into. Otherwise, you're just poking holes in the subfloor, with nothing for the fastener to bite.

DIY tip – Even if you're not replacing any flooring, you can fix squeaks yourself anytime. There is a product available which is just a small wood floor kit with screws and a special jig called "Squeak

No More". It can be found at Home Depot or Amazon for about \$15. The pro version, which includes better hardware, is about \$25. This can be used in hardwood or carpeted areas. You find a floor joist near the squeaky area by banging with a rubber mallet, and listening for hollow sounds vs. solid ones. The jig allows you to drill the specialized screw far enough down that when done right; will go through the subfloor, into the joist, and will snap off, with the help of the jig, below the floor line.
