Zoning Request: Thank you to the small group of homeowners who have been working hard to advocate for the Cary town council to not change the current **zoning** for the 1 acre parcel of land at the corner of Thurston & Wellingborough. Suzanne Puccio & Lynn Yanyo spoke at the Town council meeting on July 22 to remind the council that a 10,000 sf commercial building is not an appropriate development within our neighborhood. We are currently in the process of developing a layout for the garden and will be sectioning off areas in the fall and over the winter in preparation for the spring grand opening. Community Courtesies

Parking is one of those hot button topics in our neighborhood. We'd like to just turn down the heat on this and share why it's an important topic for all of us to consider.

You should all be aware that by living in our neighborhood, you agree to abide by our HOA

covenants, one of which states (Section 1.6 (e)) "Overnight on street parking is prohibited." The streets in our 32 year old neighborhood are narrow and make parking during the day hazardous, therefore it would be safer for everyone if we do not park on the street during the day as well.

Primary reasons not to park on the street (if you live here or overnight) include:

Reduced visibility for other cars.

Reduced visibility for pedestrians and children who walk our streets to get to the park or pool.

Our streets are narrow which only allows one car to safely pass.

Hazardous for emergency vehicles to get through in a timely manner. Parking on the street hinders the passing of emergency vehicles that are wider than a car. No one wants to have a fire-truck or ambulance delayed because of a parked car.

Consideration for your neighbors. Others in the neighborhood need to extend extra care around parked cars - that's a lot to ask of them every day.

According to the Federal Highway Administration, "On-street parking typically results in less visibility between motorists and pedestrians, especially for children. The pedestrian dart-out, often involving children, is one of the most common types of mid-block pedestrian collisions in residential areas." The child pedestrian statistics are startling and we want to ensure that our neighborhood is conscious of the risks.

Suggestions to reduce on-street parking:

Park at the clubhouse if you need overnight parking by just letting the Board know you're leaving a car there so it doesn't get towed.

You can extend/widen your driveway with approval from ARC committee.

Leave your car in your driveway during the day.

In an effort to reduce on-street parking, we wanted to help you understand why parking on our narrow streets is dangerous. The HOA Board cannot possibly police the entire neighborhood, but we would like to ensure that everyone has concern for their neighbors. Let's work together to keep our neighborhood safe.
